Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It's hard to believe we're already entering the month of November. It seems like we've hardly had time to enjoy any fall weather and before you know it we're going to be thinking about snow. But before we get there, let's stop and look toward what's to come at the end of the month. This month we look forward to celebrating Thanksgiving, and so I'd like you to spend some time thinking about just that: giving thanks.

I can't tell you the number of times I've been asked to lead the so-called "common table prayer" only to find that what I've considered common all my life is uncommon to others. I grew up learning, "come, Lord Jesus!" A phrase taken straight from the book of Revelation towards the very end of the book, the end of the Bible itself, we read,

He who testifies to these things says,  
"Surely I am coming soon." Amen. Come,  
Lord Jesus! - Rev. 22:20

This prayer is a faith-filled response to Jesus promise to return in glory and so each time we pray we are asking Christ to come soon.

That all constitutes the "common" part of the Common Table Prayer. What I've discovered is different is what comes after "come, Lord Jesus" Many like to follow up the blessing of the food by giving thanks for the food. Perhaps you're one of those who follows with the hopefully familiar "O give thanks unto the Lord..." As it turns out, this prayer shows up numerous times throughout God's Word. It can be found a couple times in Chronicles, various times in the Psalms, and even in Isaiah and Jeremiah. One psalm stands out above all the rest it is Psalm 136.

Verse 1 begins:

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good for  
his steadfast love endures forever. - Ps.  
136:1

But the psalmist then goes on Give thanks to  
the God of gods, Give thanks to the Lord of

lords. And each time the refrain gets repeated,  
"for his steadfast love endures forever."

This psalm recounts many reasons why we know God's steadfast love endures forever. In fact, I encourage you to look the psalm up and read it together. If you choose to read it as a family try treating it as a responsive psalm with one person leading and everyone else replying with the refrain. It serves as a wonderful reminder of the steadfast love God has shown us.

That being said, many have the tradition around thanksgiving time of praying about all the things we are thankful for. In some cases this involves going around the table and everyone listing something off. This is exactly what the psalmist is doing in our reading and each time a new thing gets listed we are reminded, "His steadfast love endures forever."


Each thing we have to be thankful for is another reminder of God's steadfast love. And while there may not always be specific items for us to give thanks for from this past year. We can see God's steadfast love shown to us in other ways. As we gather in His house and He proclaims his forgiveness to us, we are reminded, "His steadfast love endures forever." As He provides us food in His holy supper, we are reminded through the sustenance given, "His steadfast love endures forever." As we look forward to the joys of eternal life the promise of salvation from death itself, we are reminded again, "His steadfast love endures forever."

And so I encourage you this month, have a look at Psalm 136 see the steadfast love of the Lord recounted for the people of Israel. And then take a moment to consider how God has shown you His steadfast love as well. That we may all find reason to "give thanks to the Lord for He is good!" His steadfast love endures forever for He has shown us that love in His Son Jesus who suffered and died for us all. May we continue to

give Him thanks and praise for the steadfast love He has shown us.

## **OCTOBER 21, 2021-VOTERS MEETING RECAP**

The meeting opened with prayer, and the minutes of the previous July 18, 2021, meeting were on handouts for everyone to read. The treasurer's report was presented, and the General Fund went from \$16,272.07 as of July 1, 2021, to \$12,747.75 as of September 30, 2021. Pastor reported that the new member class has been going well and that there will be a welcoming for them and for transfers at the end of November. Because of the new member class, two new confirmands have been added. The Wednesday and Sunday Bible studies are continuing. Reformation Sunday will be celebrated October 31, and All Saints Day will be celebrated on November 7. Attendance: July-147, average 37. Communion-83, average-42. August-144, average-48. Communion-85, average-43. September-223, average-56. Communion-100, average-50. The numbers are slowly climbing. The steeple and front step projects are completed, and the sealant has been applied to the educational wing. The new doors for the parsonage are here but not yet installed. Sunday School is going well. Christmas program practice will be starting soon, and plans are to have a normal, in-person program this year. When the Highway 141 Yard Sales are held next summer, the Board of Ed is hoping to have a garage sale here at church that our members could donate items towards with the proceeds used for funding the Sunday School and VBS. Over half of the funds for the special missions project have been raised so far, with only just over \$1,000.00 left. The three sets of paraments have been ordered, and the company is confident that the red set that can be used for Reformation will arrive in time. Pastor is talking with Iowa District West on how to donate the old sets. The Budget for 2022 was presented to the voters and approved. The Nominating Committee for this year was put together, following previous procedure of having the heads of the boards plus Pastor serve on the committee. The meeting was adjourned,

and Pastor led the voters in praying the Lord's Prayer.


