Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It seems like just yesterday that we were celebrating Christmas. Our Christmas trees were all out and decorated the lights were hung all around as celebratory decorations, what a joyous time! And now here we are. It's March already and the time has come for us to move from celebrating the Epiphany of our Lord and the revelation of His light to the world. Now we move to that more solemn season of penitence: Lent.

As we consider this coming season of Lent, I found myself thinking about trees. Perhaps an odd thing for me to be considering this time of year, especially as the trees just recently received a fresh coat of snow. But trees have born a fair bit of significance throughout the Scriptures. First we have the tree of knowledge of good and evil. Where Adam and Eve found themselves tempted by the serpent and ate of that forbidden fruit.

After eating of the forbidden tree, God banished them from the garden lest they continue to eat of the Tree of Life. Now we look forward to the day when we are welcomed into God's eternal kingdom, where we will be free once again to eat of that Tree of Life. In Rev. 22, we are promised:

Blessed are those who wash their robes, so that they may have the right to the tree of life and that they may enter the city by the gates. - Rev. 22:14

As those whose robes have been washed in the blood of the Lamb, we know at the last, we will have this same right to the tree of life.

And as we consider these different trees, I can't help but think of the book, "The Tale of the Three Trees". In this book, three trees are dreaming of what they will become. They have marvelous goals aspiring to be something built for a grand hall, or a majestic ship sailing the seas. Each tree seems a bit disappointed when they are chopped down for their various purposes. One is made into a trough from which animals eat. One becomes a

fishing boat, not nearly the majestic ship it was hoping to be. And the third is cut in two and tossed into a pile until one day it is made into a cross.

While this tale is of course a fanciful tale, it leads us to the final tree I ask you to consider today, the tree of the cross. There are times in our communion liturgy that the proper preface (one of the prayers we pray as we begin the communion portion of the service) mentions this tree of the cross, contrasting it with the tree of the garden. There we pray:

"that the serpent who overcame by the tree of the garden might likewise by the tree of the cross be overcome"

St Paul also makes a similar contrast between these two trees although for Paul the focus is on the man not the tree. Paul writes,

But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many. And the free gift is not like the result of that one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brought justification. - Rom. 5:15-16

Christ suffered on the tree of the cross, that we might be redeemed from what happened at the tree of the garden.

The season of lent is one set aside for us to consider our sinfulness, our need for the tree of the cross. It should drive us forward looking to Holy Week when Christ suffered all for you and I. Ultimately leading us to Easter where we celebrate his joyous resurrection from the dead. The tree of the cross was not the end. Christ suffered on that tree so one day he could welcome us to eat from the Tree of Life. Until that day, may God continue to keep us in His grace.

Don't forget to set clocks ahead an hour before going to bed on Saturday, March 12th.

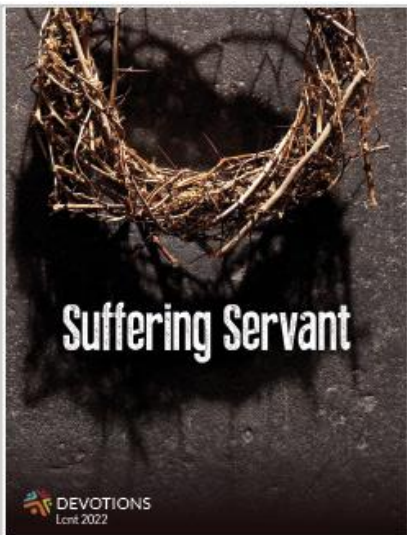


ASH WEDNESDAY

LENTEN DEVOTIONS

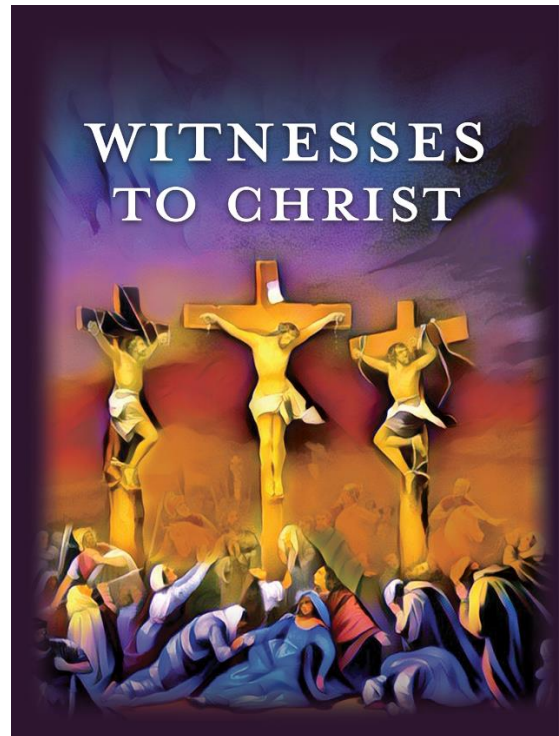
Every year Lutheran Hour Ministries makes available Lenten devotions. Copies of this devotion can be picked up from the back table in church.

Witnesses to Christ: People from His Passion

John tells us why he wrote his Gospel: "Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:30–31). Life! When we believe that Jesus is the Christ, God gives us life—abundant life, forgiven life, and eternal life.

Historically, the Fourth Gospel is likened to an eagle—an image that suggests John soars to heights of glory and grandeur. That's because the evangelist paints a stunning portrait of Jesus, who is the bread of life, the resurrection and the life, and the way, the truth, and the life. Life in Jesus. That's God's gift to you!

This Lent, our life in Christ will be strengthened as we hear the witness of those in John's Gospel who journeyed to the cross. Along the way, we'll meet villains, such as Barabbas and Pontius Pilate, as well as sinners, such as Peter (who denied Jesus *three* times), Mary Magdalene (who was possessed by *seven* demons), and Judas Iscariot (who betrayed Jesus for *thirty* pieces of silver).
