Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Well, another school year has begun. The kids are back in school and confirmation classes are getting started once again. And I can't help but think of the old saying, "you learn something new every day." As classes begin again, I'm sure this is especially true for our students, but It tends to ring true for all of us. We learn things about our friends, our jobs, and our family. We learn things about the world.

There are all sorts of ways that we can go about learning these new things. The internet is full of places we can go to learn new skills. There are plenty of books out there to teach us about whatever topic we may be interested in. Or maybe you're one who prefers to learn by doing and so as you set to a task you begin to learn what is needed to accomplish that job.

Students are sent to school to learn. Perhaps your job requires you to take some courses to learn how to operate a new machine or how to use a piece of software. Others take time to learn things simply for the enjoyment of learning something new. Whatever the case, we spend a lot of time in our lives learning.

How much of that learning time is spent studying God's Word? John tells us there's always more we could talk about when it comes to Jesus. In John 21, we read, "Now there are also many other things that Jesus did. Were every one of them to be written, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written." John 21:25 If all the books in the world couldn't contain the works of Christ, I should think we would never stop learning about Him.

David understood this. He writes in the psalms, "Make me to know your ways, O LORD; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all the day long." - Ps. 25;4-5 David knew there was always more to learn. More for God to teach us, whether we are learning about God's commands and all that He righteously requires of us, or about the good news of what He has done for us. We need to learn from Him. Many of those who approached Jesus during His ministry called Him, "rabbi" a term that means "teacher". His disciples spent much of their time learning from Him. In Matthew 13 and others, we hear the disciples approach Jesus asking Him to explain to them the parables He was teaching. They knew they had much to learn from Him. We see this desire to learn from Him not just from the disciples though. In Luke 10, we read, "Now as they went on their way, Jesus entered a village. And a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. And she had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to his teaching." - Luke 10:38-39 Mary too wanted to learn all that Jesus had to teach.

And so it should be for us. We should strive to learn all that God has to teach us in His word. In the Old Testament, the people of Israel were encouraged to discuss God's Word as they walked on the road. I was taught my second year of high school that the term sophomore can essentially be translated as "wise fool". The idea being that by that time you are wise enough to know that there's a lot you don't know. If only we could all be sophomore's, wise fools. Understanding that there's always more to learn.

Pastors, teachers, students, old and young alike, all have things we can learn. And so we ought always to be studying God's Word. And so God gives us different opportunities to learn from Him. He has given us His word in our own language that we might study it at home. He gives us opportunity to hear it preached and taught here at church on Sunday as we gather as His people to worship Him and receive His good gifts. And He invites us to join in this learning and teaching as we gather for Sunday School and various Bible Studies. I encourage you as the school year starts to ask yourself now, and throughout the year to come, "what have I learned from God's Word today?" Luther himself didn't think he knew all there was to learn of God's Word. So may we ever be life-long learners.



Dear Friends in Christ at St. Paul's,

We give thanks to God with you for His never-ending grace and mercy as you celebrate 125 years of His saving gospel being proclaimed in the Ute community. It was my privilege to serve in the gospel ministry with you for nine of those years.

For my last sermon on July 17, 2011, I used Jeremiah 29:11 as the text: "For I know the plans that I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Since that day, we have continually seen how God uses our experiences in the past to prepare us for the future. After leaving Ute, we settled in Meridian, Idaho and served a short-term mission in Macau, China that fall. Beginning in June 2012, I served a 20-month vacancy at a nearby congregation.

During that vacancy, God's plans for me started to be unveiled. By His gracious guidance, and through a jail visit and word being passed among inmates, a ministry of communication with individuals eager to hear words of hope and security began. With the Lord's blessing it developed and grew. At present it involves sending mailings of sermons and devotions, jail visits when possible, and offering phone calls and messaging to an ever-changing contact list that is nearly 100. Your theme verse is Hebrews 13:8, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." That certainty means that I can use the same message I delivered from your pulpit to bring Christ's forgiveness and life to recipients today.

We attend a growing congregation in a growing city: Good Shepherd in Boise, Idaho. I fill in when the pastor is away on church responsibilities and vacation, and for other area congregations. Good Shepherd is a singing congregation and Eileen has relished her role as regular organist and enjoys preparing for services.

The grandson we left to join is now 12 and has sisters ages 10 and 8. We have been richly blessed to experience their childhoods and assist their parents. Our daughter and her husband in Boston have a daughter, age 3, and a son, age 1. Our pastimes include extensive gardening and occasional camping. As many have discovered, it seems that "retirement" is just as busy as what preceded.

Time marches on, always moving forward. The makeup of St. Paul's congregation has no doubt changed significantly in the past 12 years. Each succeeding generation can experience the joy of hearing and believing the gospel of forgiveness and life in Christ, and the opportunity to share that good news with those seeking lasting hope and peace.

Time marches on, toward the goal of an eternal life of heavenly joy in the presence of our Savior and departed saints. May the Lord richly bless St. Paul's as you live out the plans the Lord has for you.

Dear saints of St. Paul's, Ute:

You all are looking pretty fine at the ripe of age of 125. What a wonderful blessing to celebrate your Quasquicentennial. Praise God for His providence to sustain His blessed church and you saints in every circumstance of need and abundance (Phil. 4:12). Truly, Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Heb. 13:8).

Amid all the thanksgivings for God's grace to you, this anniversary is a wonderful time for you to marvel how God has answered your prayer: Hallowed be Thy name. Luther teaches us that "God's name is kept holy when the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity, and we, as the children of God, also lead holy lives according to it. Help us to do this, dear Father in heaven! But anyone who teaches or lives contrary to God's Word profanes the name of God among us. Protect us from this, heavenly Father!"

In the years before and after A.D. 1898, the year St. Paul's was founded, who could foresee what many Christians even nominal Lutherans would become today. What could St. Paul's have been if the Norwegian Soldier congregation had come up and planted a congregation in Ute instead of the German Lutherans and families tied to Charter Oak. What would your congregation be if it were part of an evolving confession, an altered subscription, an "as long as" belief in the word of God? All these are marks of nominal Lutherans who practice and support radically different things today than in A.D. 1898.

God has blessed and sustained you despite this crumbling world. Your confession is the same as that given long before to the Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire in A.D. 1530! Your subscription of faith in God is unaltered (UAC). You believe the Word of the Lord endures forever. You praise Jesus Christ the same, yesterday, today, and forever. So many things have changed in 125 years, but God has taught His word to you in truth in purity for you to lead holy lives according to it. He has kept you from profane practices and false teaching. You have God's law and Gospel, to command and comfort you, to convict and forgive you in the name of our crucified and risen Lord, Jesus Christ. Maybe there are less people in the pews than there were years ago, but there's not any less truth in God's Word and salvation for you in Christ Jesus. For He is the same, yesterday, today, and forever.

Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great Shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, equip you with everything good that you may do His will, working in us that which is pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen. (Hebrews 13:20-21)
